Radnor Lake license plates: The gift that keeps on giving.

Currently there are approximately 2,000 active Radnor Lake plates. **Help us raise that number to 2,500 in 2015.**

Have you seen Radnor Lake license plates in our parking lots and around town? The specialty plates raise awareness about our state natural area and help fund mission-driven activities including purchases of additional property, continued trail maintenance, volunteer support, and educational programs. Tennessee specialty license plates allow you to show people what you care about, and provide revenue for these activities.

Thanks to stalwart proponents and countless hours from Friends of Radnor Lake Board members like Ann Tidwell, former park staff and help from Senator Douglas Henry, the Radnor Lake License plate made it through the legislature and became available in 1998. Funds started to be directed to Radnor Lake in 2003. Since then this program has generated over \$500,000 for land acquisition and park support, and the ongoing support from our license plate bearing friends provides tens of thousands of dollars annually.

On June 16th, Radnor Lake State Natural Area reopened the Walter Criley Visitor Center.

Celebrated by a ribbon cutting ceremony with TDEC Commissioner Bob Martineau, the Walter Criley Visitor Center is now open to be enjoyed by more than one million annual visitor to Badnor Lake State Natural Area.

The \$500,000 renovation focused on improving interpretive exhibits, ADA accessibility and energy efficiency. The

concept for this project was completed by Studio Eight Design and was approved and funded in partnership with the State of Tennessee, Friends of Radnor Lake and an in-kind donation from Joan Lagrasse, owner and CEO of Imagen and Studio Eight Design.

Construction crews from Concord Building Group and Imagen worked diligently making improvements to the building to enhance visitor usage and experience. New display cases were installed and numerous energy efficient changes were made during this process thanks to TDEC's Office of Sustainability grant funds for Radnor Lake.

Special thanks to Studio Eight Design, Concord Building Group, Imagen, Friends of Radnor Lake, State of Tennessee, Radnor Lake staff and all of our volunteers who contributed their time and photographs for our displays.

Radnor gets an energy makeover, saves money

It's 90 degrees outside the Radnor Lake State Park and Natural Area visitor's center on a sunny Friday afternoon. The parking lot is full and visitors are going in and out, but all is cool inside.

With new energy-efficient upgrades at the visitor's center and ranger residences, park staff don't have to sweat their utility costs either. Since last summer, the park has been working with the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation's Office of Sustainable Practices on numerous energy conservation projects. Enhancements to the Visitor Center and several ranger residences include: installing spray foam insulation; replacing old, inefficient water heaters; converting lights to LEDs; installing Energy Star Windows and installing new energy-efficient insulated doors.

The partnership between the Office of Sustainable Practices, Friends of Radnor Lake, and Tennessee State Parks has "enabled us to efficiently manage our operation dollars to better serve and protect Radnor Lake State Natural Area for years to come," said Park Manager, Steve Ward. He hopes that maximizing taxpayer dollars to create a more energy efficient park will serve as a role model to other parks. Ward said the spray foam in buildings has "made all the difference." The insulation acts as a sealant for any gaps or holes in buildings keeping the cold air in and hot air out in the summer and doing the opposite in the winter. The insulation in the Visitor Center could help save the park up to 20 percent on their annual utility bills.

The Office of Sustainable Practices welcomed the opportunity to use their expertise to make the park even better. Chad Kimes, an Environmental Specialist in the Office of Sustainable Practices said, "Not only were we able to replace inefficient, older equipment, but ultimately we were able to protect our natural resources by lowering greenhouse gas emissions."

The park's Hideaway House ranger residence also received spray foam insulation to fill in various gaps around windows and doors and helped to stabilize the roof and attic. The five-room farmhouse, built in 1904, "is now more soundproof. The house is simply tighter," said Steve Ward. Special thanks to Egotia, LLC for the spray foam insulation.

Frist Foundation awards Technology Grant to Radnor Lake

Our rangers were thrilled to learn that each will receive a new laptop computer through a Frist Foundation Technology grant. The machines will be used to gather research, to develop interpretative programs, and to improve communication with park visitors through social media. Ultimately, the new technology will enhance park operations and make for a better visitor experience.
